Roosters

In 1478, the Medici family in Italy sent each of the peasant families of Gallina a ceramic rooster as a symbol of good luck, protection, and prosperity. This symbolism is represented today at Zinna's Bistro with our collection of roosters, including many of which have been donated by our committed guests.

When you are at Zinna's, you are part of the family.

30 of the roosters in our collection came from a great guest who had them tucked away, saw our collection and dropped them off as a gift. She only asked that the roosters be displayed for all to enjoy. Now that's family!

Several roosters were also donated by the owners' aunt Bonnie and Sandy!

1940s Canoe

This 16-foot old town canoe was hand-crafted during the fall of 1945 through the winter of 1946 and purchased by Herbert F. Grote of New Brunswick, New Jersey. Herbert, a WWI veteran, ran



his own canoe and rowboat rental business until his death in 1967. The canoe is a 'Yankee' model with ash decks and open spruce gunwales. The build was completed on October 1, 1945, with varnishing and coloring (painting) continuing into December of that year. Canoe NO. 142,870 was completed on January 2, 1946, and featured a dark green finish exterior to complement the varnished wood interior.



In this photo, the canoe's initial deep green finish is revealed, a stark contrast to its current weathered beauty.







The image to the right displays the official paperwork capturing the meticulously documented journey of crafting and shipping the canoe, bearing the seal of approval from the Wood Canoe Heritage Association (WCHA). Within these historic papers, a comprehensive narrative of the canoe's finishing process is provided.



Babci's Hutch

This treasured hutch was built by Chris Zinna's father and mother, who helped sand, stain, and varnish it, as a heartfelt gift to his grandmother—or "Babci". Following her passing, the family heirloom found a new purpose within the walls of our restaurant, adding a touch of familial history to the ambiance.

Large Billow

The large billow that sits atop one of the hutches in our dining room was originally built in the early 1800's. The billow, which was donated by Chris Zinna's uncle Joe, was taken out of a foundry in

Trenton, NJ and relocated to Zinna's Bistro.







Sewing Machine POS Stand

Although it hasn't produced any clothing in quite some time, this vintage Singer sewing machine comes equipped with a foot pedal that is still fully operational! The wooden slab on top of it is maple wood originating from a tree removal job done in Ewing township. The stand was assembled by Doug Noebels (better known as Uncle Doug), a good friend of the Zinna's family.

Famiglia e Amici

This Italian expression directly translates to "Family and Friends". The ash wood comes from a tree removal job done by owner, Chris Zinna, in Somerset County. After transporting the wood, it was finished, and the letters were added by Chris himself to create this beloved sign.







Wooden Tree Sculpture

The intricate twisting and winding branches of this tree sculpture were crafted from electrical wire. The design was then plastered on a slab of wood from a cherry tree. The piece was provided by our good friend, Doug Noebels (Uncle Doug).

Tutti al Tavolo

This Italian phrase translates to "Everyone at the table". It reflects the warm and inclusive spirit of Italian dining culture, in which the community gathers to share delicious meals and create cherished memories together. The foundation of the piece was brought over from a sign previously used at the old Zinna's Bistro location on South River Road, and the letters were provided by Bruce Tallon at Brunswick Sign.





Butter Churner

Once fully functional and in use, this butter churner was found at a garage sale and donated by Doug Noebels (Uncle Doug). While traditional butter churners may not be a common sight in modern Italian dining, they evoke a sense of nostalgia and remind us of the timeless culinary traditions that will forever continue to influence the

Italian dining experience.







Whiskey and Wine **Barrel**

These are real whiskey and wine barrels purchased by the owners of Zinna's Bistro at a garage sale. Barrels such as these play an essential part in shaping the flavors and aromas of some of our favorite beverages. Through the process of barrel aging, whiskey gains its complexity and richness; and wine achieves great depth and character through the same process.







Cork Screws

These corkscrewlike structures, donated by Robert Barnes, were once part of a grain bin and were assembled by Chris Zinna and his Uncle Doug. They cut and fastened the handles before transporting the structures to this restaurant. Grain bins are essential agricultural structures used to store and protect harvested grains that are vital ingredients in the food we eat every day.

Wine Vines

After deciding to deviate from traditional cork artwork, owner Chris Zinna chose to go a more unique route. Fascinated by the look of grape vines cascading throughout a vineyard, he was compelled to bring that same effect indoors. Using empty wine bottles left behind by guests, Chris built the entirety of these intricate structures by hand and mounted them up on the walls and ceilings.







Milk Jugs

Vintage milk jugs such as these are nostalgic relics of a time when milk was delivered door-to-door in charming collectible containers. These particular milk jugs were donated to us by two of our appreciated guests, Tom and Carol.







Field Plow

This vintage John Deere field plow was found at a garage sale before being brought to Zinna's Bistro to decorate our onsight garden. John Deere field plows have been a cornerstone of efficient farming for generations. Known for their efficiency in turning soil, they continue to be reliable tools for farmers worldwide.







Steel-Wheel Tractor

This steel-wheel tractor from Jays Towing and Recovery was donated to the owners of Zinna's Bistro by good friends. Prior to the more modern rubbertired tractors we see today, these tractors were a common sight on farms in the early 20th century. Steel wheel tractors were an essential step in agricultural mechanization.


Wine Box Wall

This small carriage hails from the home of Babci Lili, the owner's grandmother—where "Babci" affectionately translates to grandmother in polish. The carriage was handmade in the 1940s and is meant not for an actual child, but for a baby doll!







Smoker






Host Stand

Block and Tackle

Beyond its use in the water, this block and tackle is symbolic of resilience and teamwork; qualities that resonate strongly with the Zinna's team.







Dough bowl

This rustic addition to our dining room nook was purchased by Chris Zinna's mother, Landi, in Hagerstown, Maryland. It is a burl bowl, meaning it was made from the large, woody, round swelling on the trunk of a tree. Burl wood is characterized by its unique and unusual grain pattern, which swirls around each bud trace and forms interesting patterns in the wood.

Gracing our restaurant with its timeless elegance, this colorful vase was handcrafted in Italy and given to us by our friend, Alan Summerville.








Vintage cans






Wine press
